My annual report for 2022/23 is short and sweet.

Farming seems to be getting harder, in particular with negative outside influences having a long effect.

Ram sales will become harder with the land use changes we are seeing across the country. In my area alone

there have been 10 farms sold to forestry, with a net loss of 35,000 stock units and the associated loss of good farming community people that goes along with these changes. It is a blow to our smaller communities.

With this in mind, I urge our breeders to keep improving their stock at every turn and congratulate Collie Hills Stud (Eric Ross and Wade Newlands) on their sale-topping records ram sale price.

I sincerely thank the Suffolk NZ committee for their good work and continued support. In particular, I would mention Suffolk stalwart, Debbie Holmes, for her hard work compiling our Breed Newsletter. Her dedication to the job is to be admired.

I would also like to thank Greg, Anne and Lyndsay at NZ Sheepbreeders for their continued support over the year.

BREED COMMITTEE:

Suffolk members are asked to please contact your local breed representative if you wish to nominate anyone for this very prestigious award.

CPT & ACROSS FLOCK UPDATE:

Suffolk NZ was unable to have a ram in this year's CPT Trial. This is the first year for many years we have not had at least one ram in the trial. I will be really pushing our case to gain a space in next year's trial for at least one Suffolk ram as this is the best way to link Suffolk NZ with the whole sheep industry, making our figures more relevant.

On a more positive note, we have just received the latest Suffolk NZ Across Flock report which makes for very interesting reading. Suffolk NZ Across Flock group is above average for weaning weight, liveweight 8(200-day weight) and meat. This is something we as Suffolk breeders already knew and we now have the data to back this up.

Suffolk NZ has a number of 2022 born rams which have NZTW (Terminal Sire Worth) over 2000, which is very impressive.

Again, this year there are five Suffolk rams in the Duncraigen Eating Quality and IMF Trial. We eagerly await the results of this trial.

If you already record your Suffolks on SIL, I urge you to consider joining the Suffolk NZ Across Flock. We currently have 20 breeders.

If you don't already record your Suffolks on SIL and are interested, please contact me or one of our Breed Committee members. It requires no more recording than what most of you are already doing and it is a backup if, heaven forbid, something happens, and you lose your records. (It's a very good back up).

The more Suffolks we have recorded on SIL the better our indexes will become, and the accuracy will improve.

Across Flock members check out the traffic light page and see how linked you are and if you need to improve your linkages. If so, start making plans to do so before next mating. *Chris Hampton, SuffolkNZ CPT & Across Flock manager.*

OBITUARY:



BRUCE RAPLEY.

Goldstream Stud, Suffolk Flock 399, Otorohanga Life Member SUFFOLKNZ

Bruce Rapley and his wife Thelma founded their Goldstream Suffolk Stud

in 1978 near Otorohanga, Waikato, where they were also farming their Goldstream Ayrshire Stud. The 2 studs complimented each other with the Suffolks running on the rougher parts of the farm & the Ayrshire cows on the flats. Goldstream's foundation ewes were purchased from

S. McKelvie 'Pukemarama' (Flk.117) in 1978.

Ewes were hard to come by in the 1970's and Bruce built the flock up to 22 ewes by 1983 from several well-known studs. In 1983-84, he purchased a further 57 from Andrew Dobson 'Te Whananake' (Flk.215), and 85 from Brian Richardson 'Richos'(Flk.489) and continued purchasing several ewes from many very well-known breeders right up to this year.

In 1984 the Stud transferred to the new owners, BR & T Rapley and Family Trust.

Stud rams from the top echelon of Studs, both from the North & South Island, and Australia have also been purchased to cover these ewes.

Bruce was Chairman of the Suffolk Breed Society & Breed Committee member for several years and in 2012 he was made a Life Member of SuffolkNZ.

He was very forward-thinking regarding performance recording. His thoughts were that all Suffolk Breeders should be on the same recording program and encouraged every Suffolk breeder to be on SIL. His rams have been on the top of the indexes of SIL for many years and have been used by many other Studs to upgrade the SIL indexes of their flocks.

In the early 1990's some Suffolk rams with USA genetics were imported into New Zealand. At least one of them was later found to carry one copy of the Spider Syndrome gene. Bruce was instrumental at setting the pathway to eradication of this gene in NZ flocks. As soon as there was a reliable gene marker test found in the world, Bruce tested the whole Goldstream flock, making Goldstream the first FTN flock in NZ. This testing was done in the USA. Bruce then liaised with Massey University and eventually testing was able to be done in NZ.

A compulsory ruling was made by the Breed Committee that all Stud breeding rams be tested. In 2002, 834 blood samples were tested & 103 were carriers. Numbers then gradually dropped down to zero in 2014.

In 2015, After much discussion with Professor Hugh Blair, Deputy Head of the Institute of Veterinary, Animal & Biomedical Science at Massey, the SuffolkNZ Committee decided to make testing no longer compulsory & would be at the buyers cost if they wanted it done. We owe a great debt to Bruce for his dedication to help in eradicating this genetic disorder in NZ.

Over the years, Goldstream has exported Rams, Ewes, Embryos & Semen to the UK, Ireland, Brazil, China, Japan, Mexico & Australia. Son Craig related to me that Goldstream had sold a ½ share in a ram for \$13,000 at Feilding Sale. Unbelievable for a ½ share!

Both Bruce & Thelma were an integral part of the Northern NI Club until it was untenable for us to have meetings, with members being so distantly spread.

I shall miss the knowledge that he would impart, every time that we met.

Our Deepest Sympathy goes to Thelma, Craig, Warwick & their respective families.

At our Committee meeting on the 19th May, the Committee stood for a minutes silence as a show of respect for Bruce Rapley, who had passed away recently.

Bruce was a highly regarded member of Suffolk NZ serving as a committee member from 1995-2006 and Chairman from 2001-2003.

Bruce had a keen eye for stock and the performance of both Goldstream Suffolks and Poll Dorset's on the national stage are testament to this.

An example of the calibre of these genetics was Goldstream 275/04. An exceptional sheep, he was purchased by Paki-Iti, Tyanee, Valdor and Pahiwi at the 2005 Feilding ram fair.

He performed very well in these flocks and excelled in the CPT (Central Progeny Test.)

Bruce along with his wife Thelma always enjoyed getting out and about visiting fellow breeders both on the Suffolk tours and in between. Bruce enjoyed the challenge of finding the right genetics for his flock and you always knew at a ram fair that when Bruce had his poker face on, he'd found a sheep he wanted!

Bruce achieved success as a breeder through the performance of Goldstream genetics in stud and commercial flocks. His keen interest and leadership in SIL recording, progeny trials and our own across flock data has been hugely beneficial for the Suffolk breed.

On behalf of the Suffolk NZ committee, I would like to express our condolences to Thelma and family and wish them all the best at this difficult time.

Bruce, once Spider Syndrome appeared in New Zealand made every effort personally to find out all about this recessive gene.

He travelled to Massey numerous times and spoke to geneticists at length. He also liaised with Australia and helped establish a testing facility in Australia for Spider Syndrome, before a facility was available in New Zealand.

He was instrumental in aiding the Suffolk breed through this issue which could have been catastrophic for the Suffolk brand.

He was often termed the 'Grandfather of the Suffolk breed'. Even when the retired from the Breed Committee he was always aware of breed developments and would never hesitate in contacting members of the Breed Committee and myself.

Bruce certainly made a difference.

JOHN DuFAUR. Glenbrook Stud, Suffolk Flock 882, Waiuku

John worked off farm as an Engineer inspecting roads and bridges in the Manukau City Ward during the week and

spent most of the weekends attending his sheep. He was extremely passionate about his sheep.

He established Glenbrook Suffolk Stud in 1998, with ewes from Woodbine & Val D'or studs & using embryo transplants with Advancer 12231/89.

Further ewes were purchased from Courtenay, Ngatarawa, Mornish and Torresdale bloodlines.

Glenbrook Poll Dorset stud was established in 1999, and in 2007 a Dorset Horn stud was also added.

Brian & I first met John when we started our Suffolk Stud in 2003. We struck up a friendship with John & his late wife Jacque along with Colin & Margaret Irwin, who were all stalwarts of the Northern NI Suffolk Club and of which John was Chairman for a short term.

We all participated in all the Northern NI Club feature days and in shows – from Whangarei to Waikato. We enjoyed the friendly rivalry that came with them and always had a bet on who could pip who off the 1st place perch.

Stud breeding was a major part of all our lives, and we participated in many Suffolk Tours together.

John's sheep exploits were quite an amusing event sometimes. He had purchased some ewe lambs from the late Selwyn Boon's 'Lochaire' Stud, and their first outing was to a show at Clevedon. Dorset horn lambs have VERY sharp little horns. He rolled up in his truck and tried to unload them for the first time. You could hear "ooohh, oooww, ouch ya bastard" to our amusement & everyone else that was exhibiting... consequently he was wearing knee length cricket pads at the next show.

He also leased a grazing block at a fancy farm near Clevedon that was a Wedding event centre. He got the call from the owner that one of his sheep had drowned in the pond and he needed to remove it immediately. So over he went to retrieve it, & it was in the middle of the pond. He stripped down to his undies and swam out to get it. He turned around to drag it back when the wedding party arrived at the same time. All John could do was smile & wave.... thank goodness TikTok & Instagram weren't around then, or he would have been starring on social media.

Unfortunately, his wife Jacque passed away after a short illness & John was like a lost sheep without her.

His dream was to always retire to the beach, so he could put his feet up, fish all day & enjoy beach life.

So, we weren't surprised when he started to disperse his sheep flocks & sold up his little block in Waiuku & moved to Pauanui on the Coromandel Peninsular and was still travelling to Auckland each day to work.

Unfortunately, his health deteriorated, and he passed away after a short illness on 19th May 2023 at Thames Hospital.

STRUCTURAL SOUNDNESS / CONFORMATION

FRONT LEGS

Legs should be straight when viewed from the front. Knockkneed sheep may have turned-out front feet, while bowlegged animals roll their feet as they walk. In both cases this leads to sheep whose feet will not wear correctly, which in turn equates to lameness. Viewed from the side, forearm and canon bone should be in a straight line. Excessively heavy bones and short canons should be avoided, as unnaturally short legs will handicap hill sheep.

HIND LEGS

Well-defined and correctly angled joints are critical to a sheep's wellbeing and mobility. This is especially important to a ram during mating when joints are under extra stress.

PASTERNS AND FEET

Angles of different pastern joints:

The way the hooves grow can indicate structural problems further up the legs. Long or too-short claws may indicate too much or not enough pastern angle, causing the claws of the hoof to grow or wear excessively. In both cases the mobility and performance of the animal is compromised.



Slow Cooker Pulled Mongolian Lamb

Taste.co.au 15m prep 6h 20m cook 6 servings

Sue Ross, Collie Hills Stud, served this for lunch with several types



of Bread Rolls on our recent Suffolk Tour, absolutely delicious!!

INGREDIENTS

tbsp vegetable oil
 brown onion, chopped
 garlic cloves, crushed
 tsp finely grated fresh Ginger
 tsp Chinese five spice
 80ml (1/3 cup) hoisin sauce
 60ml (1/4 cup) soy sauce
 60ml (1/4 cup) Shaoxing wine
 2kg lamb shoulder (on the bone)
 tsp sesame oil

METHOD

1. Heat vegetable oil in a frying pan over medium heat. Add onion. Cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until soft. Add the garlic and ginger. Cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Stir through the five spice, hoisin, soy and wine.

2. Place the lamb into the slow cooker. Add onion mixture. Cover and cook on Low, turning lamb halfway through, for 8 hours or until tender.

3. Carefully transfer the lamb to a chopping board. Trim fat, then pull the meat off the bone. Shred with a fork or leave in chunks if you like. Use a ladle to skim the fat from the surface of the sauce in the slow cooker.

4. Return the meat to the slow cooker. Stir through the sesame oil. Top with shallot. Divide among serving bowls.

TO SERVE

Serve with steamed rice & Broccolini <u>OR</u> serve with crusty bread.
